The Benefits of Graduate Internships

The English summer has finally arrived and with it Graduation season. As the class of 2017 don their caps and gowns their attention turns to the crossroads, further study, a year out or the start of a career?

While many have secured a role, others are unsure of their next step and the rise of the graduate internship is proving a popular choice for both graduates and recruiters.



Graduate internships provide practical experiences to individuals with a degree looking to develop the relevant knowledge and skills required to enter into a particular career.

The graduates benefit greatly from internships; including improvements in understanding a career, soft skills, marketability and work readiness. The experience at a key moment in their working lives can build a vital network of contacts that enhance job prospects. Employers benefit by obtaining inexpensive, qualified and motivated labour. The "try before you buy" approach allows employers to identify potential future staff in a more effective way than 'snap-shot' interviews.

So before you finally cut those "apron strings" and let your graduates fly how can you best prepare them to bridge that gap between academia and the professional world? At the University of Salford, like many of you, we have run a "Graduate Gateway" Programme, with the focus historically being on career management. This year we have taken the different approach to the programme. Firstly the aim is to raise our graduates' Human, Social, Cultural and Psychological Capitals to better prepare them for a successful career and easier transition into graduate employment, and in the first instance to take advantage of graduate Internship opportunities with fast growing businesses within the North West.

The University of Salford targeted these fast growing businesses as often, the most meaningful and rewarding intern opportunities are with start-ups, scale-ups and small businesses. The main barriers to graduates applying for such roles are:

- 1. Graduates are unaware of the opportunities
- 2. Smaller businesses find it hard to reach graduates, and therefore their vacancies slip under graduate job hunting radars

By engaging with our graduates <u>before</u> the end of teaching we hope to raise their awareness of these internship options to our graduates. The programme also offers a portal to our local businesses which affords an instant impact with graduates and business partners ensuring new graduate talent is matched with exciting internship opportunities and easier access to the student and graduate talent pool the university has to offer. Due to a myriad of pressures, too many graduates rashly accept the first job that comes along, which can cause issues later. By promoting these opportunities, graduates have the chance to take some time to work out what they want to do and they just might find their niche and passion. For businesses, this form of recruitment affords a better opportunity for 'on the job' assessment, with a view to filling permanent roles. And for us (the important ones in all this!), it is a chance to open up potential placement opportunities for your UG and PG students.

So, why not think again about developing your Graduate Internship opportunities, and this time next year, you could be benefitting from the fruits of your labours, with many more of your graduates taking their first career steps and with a many more placement opportunities to boot!
